GLOBAL EDUCATION FOR ALL: BUILDING BRIDGES BETWEEN LOCAL AND INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

At UC Davis, we understand that one way to ensure that studying abroad is more meaningful is to intentionally bring together local and global students in the classroom, teaching them how to work together, understand different perspectives and recognize the interconnected nature of our global society. This spring, Chinese, South Korean and Japanese students from UC Davis' Global Study Program joined American UC Davis undergraduate students in an East Asian Studies Research Seminar. The second offering of its kind, this course is a collaboration between the Global Study Program and the East Asian Studies Department.

Led by Xiaoling Shu, professor of sociology and director of East Asian Studies, the seminar discusses the state of research in the social sciences and humanities in East Asia. The teaching faculty is composed of prominent scholars in social sciences and humanities, including Drs. Beverly Bossler (History), Wing Woo (Economics), Sheldon Lu (Comparative Literature), Bo Feng (Communication) and Jaeho Cho (Communication).

International students participating in the course provide unique insights and help fellow students from diverse fields ranging from Computer Science to East Asian Studies—have a more global classroom. Visiting international students in the Global Study Program value the focused educational environment that UC Davis provides. "Fellow classmates had attended UC Davis for their study abroad, and I thought I would also do well in this environment," said Chen Jing of Renmin University in Beijing, China. "I came to study and learn without the distractions of the big cities."

RECOGNIZING UC DAVIS' COMMITMENT TO ITS STUDENTS, SOCIETY AND BEYOND

UC Davis was named one of the top colleges advocating for mental health awareness, coming in at number two on the list. Published in *College Magazine*, the article, "Top 10 Colleges Advocating for Mental Health Awareness," describes the campus and our students as the top of its class in combating the stigma surrounding mental health. In particular, the article stated that "UC Davis recognizes everything wellness entails—both physical and mental."

The American Association for the Advancement of Science recognized UC Davis for its work in advancing diversity, equity and inclusion—and its commitment to do even more. The school was awarded the scientific society's Bronze Award certification in the new STEM Equity Achievement (SEA) Change Initiative.

UC Davis also makes great strides in helping people around the world. Professor Keith David Watenpaugh, a distinguished UC Davis professor and director, wanted to address the sufferings caused by attacks on students and scholars in other countries. Thus, Article 26 Backpack was created to serve as a humanitarian tool for refugees in Lebanon. It allows displaced people to securely store and share documents, such as transcripts and résumés, with universities, scholarship agencies and employers.

Finally, UC Davis continues to grow its vision for changing the world by maintaining its "greenestin-the-U.S." status. Based on GreenMetric, which measures each participating school's commitment to developing an "environmentally friendly" infrastructure, UC Davis is 3rd in the world out of 719 universities in 81 countries. This makes UC Davis the GreenMetric leader in the United States for the second year in a row, highlighting UC Davis' promise to bettering the world around us.
